



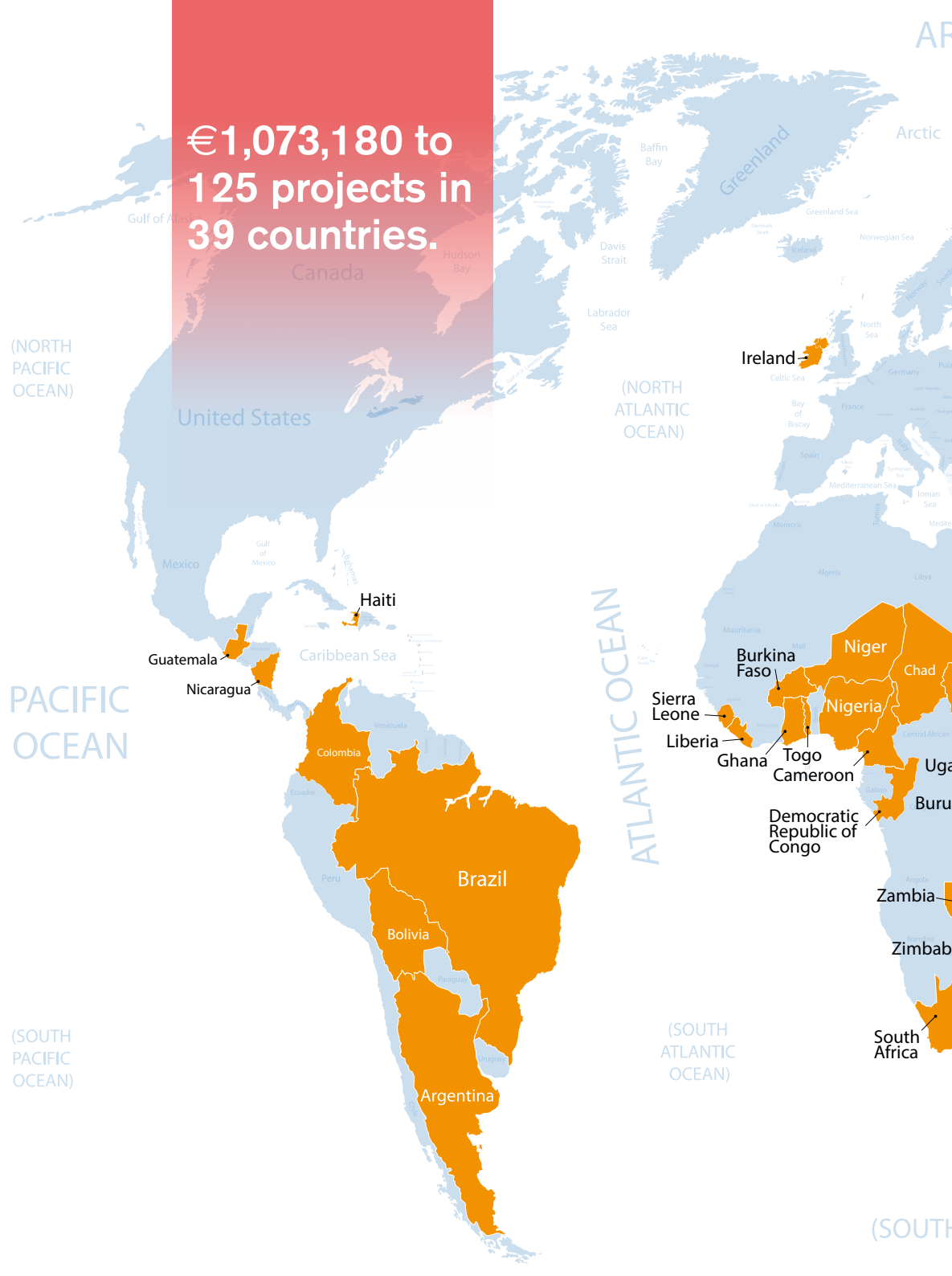

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

COUNTRY: BURUNDI

Welcome to ElectricAid's 2018 Annual Report.

The generosity of our members, ESB and EirGrid has enabled ElectricAid to fund 125 projects, dispensing over €1 million. The geographic spread of funding has positively impacted on thousands of lives across Asia, Africa, Europe, South and Middle America and here at home in Ireland.

ElectricAid is primarily engaged in development funding, however, we respond to emergencies and humanitarian appeals. In August 2018, the province of Kerala in India experienced high levels of rainfall during the monsoon season, resulting in devastating floods. ElectricAid responded through our emergency fund to the tune of €20,750, to provide basic family kits and emergency supplies.

Income during 2018 remained steady at €1,181,225, with no Special Appeal run in the calendar year. 2018 saw membership decrease marginally to 2536. Maintaining both income and membership for ElectricAid is an ongoing challenge.

ElectricAid is over thirty years old and has changed little in how it operates, the model was successful to date but we must adapt to a faster moving world, higher turnover of staff, and compete for space in overcrowded and fast-paced media streams. All while being constrained by the rules of GDPR which came in to effect in May 2018.

In November 2018, members of the Committee and Office attended The Bolder Board Training event with internationally renowned Dan Pallotta. The event was hosted by Charities Institute Ireland and is part of the Catalyst for Change conference series. Pallotta encourages boards or committees to set big challenges, be bold in engaging members and supporters. We must take inspiration from this event. Ensuring members join and stay not only safeguards ElectricAid's future but means we can continue to aid development at home and abroad.

The ElectricAid Office continue to communicate with stories of projects, funding and development articles on www.electricaid.ie public website, Electric Mail, internally on social media feeds ESB's Yammer and EirGrid's Buzz. Please visit the public site, follow us, share content and most importantly, ensure your GDPR preferences are updated so that we can continue to communicate with you.

ElectricAid leveraged the popularity of two high profile events within the ESB social calendar - The Power Challenge and Athletic Club 5km Run. Both were very successful with ElectricAid benefiting not just from the funds raised but also the publicity that surrounds such well attended and high energy occasions.

2018 is also the first year that ElectricAid co-opted graduates on to the Committee as a means to engaging with younger incoming staff. David Boyne and Stephen St Leger on ESB's Graduate Program have joined the Committee since November and will continue until September when we envisage recruiting from the 2019 class.

On 25th May 2018, GDPR came into legislation, while a challenge to ElectricAid, it was a well-publicised date and we mobilised as early as possible in getting ElectricAid ready and compliant. It is still early days and GDPR has changed the rules of engagement with both our members and potential members, ElectricAid initiated new processes, forms, and communications to effectively transition in to this new era. Taxation rebates are one of ElectricAid's income streams, worth over €200,000 in 2018. Many of the five year enduring forms signed by members in 2013 are set to expire in 2018/2019. Our foremost challenge for 2019 is getting members to sign a renewed tax form to maintain this revenue.

Central to ElectricAid's operating model is the refereeing of projects by ESB and EirGrid staff and pensioners. I would like to thank those who have refereed projects and emphasise the importance of such introductions. I would also like to thank members and partners who have visited projects on our behalf, often on their personal travels, another practice ElectricAid encourages and appreciates.

My tenure as Chairperson coincided with some significant change. James Foley retired in May 2018 following 14 years as ElectricAid Office Manager. Fergal FitzGerald and Diane Fannin (CSR – People & Organisational Development) made the transition seamlessly, taking the baton and running with immense efficiency and professionalism. On behalf of the Committee and our membership, I want to offer my sincerest thank you to both Fergal and Diane for their dedication in running the ElectricAid Office.

In 2018, Michael Sweetman was the ElectricAid summer placement student, he was tenacious in pursuing project reports and contributed to a wide range of functions within the ElectricAid Office. We wish Michael all the best in his studies and for the future.

Throughout the year, there are many individuals and business units that assist ElectricAid by providing essential services, very often behind the scenes. Thank you to those in the Copy Bureau, Mailing Room, Payroll Control, ITS, Facilities, ElectricMail and EirGrid Media.

ESB X-Site's Fergal Egan facilitated a workshop with the Committee. I would like to thank Fergal for his time, hopefully ESB X-Site will continue to assist as we expand our bolder thinking to include members' and non-members' inputs, turning ideas in to actions as part of the ElectricAid Business Plan.

ElectricAid has local contacts across ESB, I would like to thank them for their support. In the year ahead as ElectricAid works towards new initiatives, we will need your support even more.

Finally, I would like to thank ElectricAid's 2536 members for your continued support, compassion and contributions in 2018. It is your generosity that underpins ElectricAid's work, at home and abroad, with the most disadvantaged and vulnerable of communities. Please continue to do what you are doing, you are the essence of ElectricAid.

EXECUTIVE REVIEW 2018

As a community, ElectricAid members are spread throughout Ireland, with the going live of GDPR in May, our ability to maintain regular contact with members is somewhat curtailed. Furthermore, our critical objective of retaining and growing our membership means regular contact with members and potential members is more essential than ever. In June 2018 ESB launched a Yammer account dedicated to CSR activity throughout the company. In the final 6 months of 2018 the account featured 30 ElectricAid posts reaching 11,684 views. We are active and we are visible.

Furthermore, significant efforts went to working with our partners on keeping our project reports up to date. Regular reminders are being issued and reports are making their way in and feature weekly on our website.

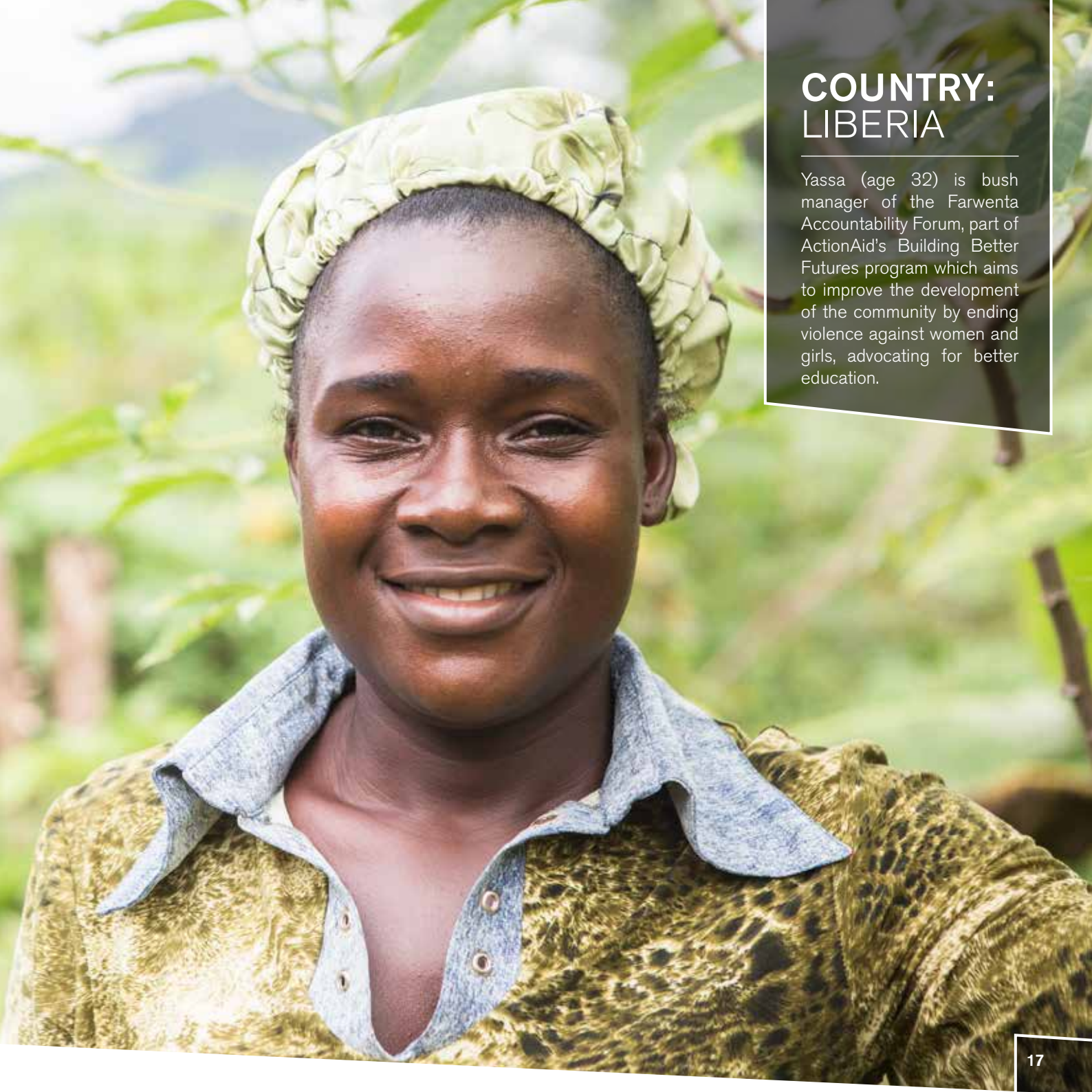
While covered already, it's important to note that the generosity of the entire ElectricAid community is never taken for granted.

OVERHEADS & EFFICIENCY

For 2018, I am pleased to report that ESB continues to cover the cost of ElectricAid's overheads and expenses. We are unique in that our single cost relates to bank charges, which for the year amounted to €1,094.03 (down from €1,500 in 2017). This single cost means that 99.9% of funding allocated during 2018 went towards delivering projects worldwide and we are extremely grateful to ESB for this support.

Further to this, we continue to practice our policy of not funding overhead or expenses for the projects or NGOs that we fund.





COUNTRY: LIBERIA

INCOME

Our income model remains in a good position and is derived from three core sources

- 1 – Donors subscriptions
- 2 – ESB & EirGrid matched funding
- 3 – Revenue Commissioners Charitable Donation Scheme.

In 2013, the Revenue Commissioners amended the Charitable Donation Scheme to allow certificates signed by donors to remain valid for 5 years. The first of our CHY3 forms expire in 2019 and regular communications have been issued to all members to renew their CHY3 form at the earliest opportunity and a CHY3 form has been included in this report for your convenience (see page 55).



COUNTRY: BOLIVIA

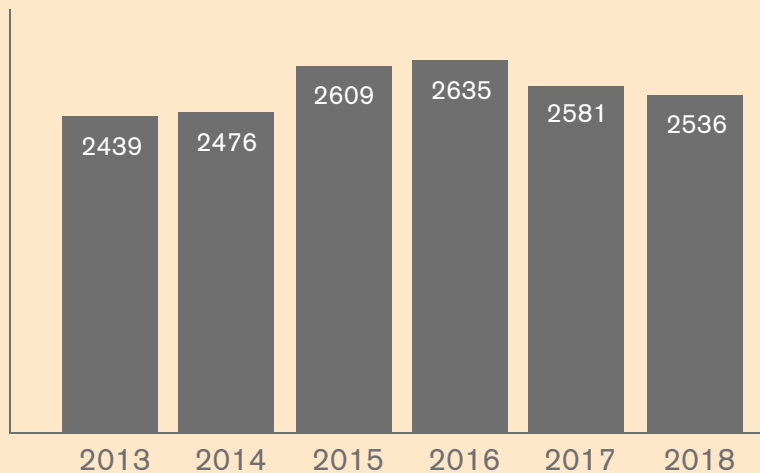

MEMBERSHIP

Of continuing concern is our reduction in members where we have dropped to 2536 in 2018 against 2581 in 2017. We currently sit at 22% of eligible ESB staff supporting ElectricAid compared to the UK average of 4%, we are still streets ahead but must continue our efforts to remain a relevant, compelling charity for ESB & EirGrid Staff.

We continue our recruiting efforts by attending every induction for new staff joining ESB.

Communications

Managing ElectricAid, and building the ElectricAid community, is about communications, in so many different ways. A simple “thank-you” card can make a big difference to a new member or once-off donor. A note in the post about a Special Appeal to our retired members is the most productive communicating we do. Keeping our membership up-to-date via the Hub, Staff Notice Board, Yammer and Buzz in EirGrid media is an ongoing task, and one which we do well.

Our AGM also forms an important part of our communications efforts and offers an open floor to discuss ElectricAid’s past performance and some future plans.

Our own website, ElectricAid has seen a reduction in readership, our main referral website – the route through which readers find our site is our Yammer feed. A further review of IP addresses shows readers from right around the world checking in on project updates. We will continue to promote our work through electricaid.ie and later this year plan to freshen up the site and keep current.

Our hosting fee with WordPress remains €99 per annum. Well worthwhile considering the site became a key element of seeking GDPR approvals from our members.

In closing, I want to congratulate our Chair, Éadaoin, for her first year in the role. Your leadership and guidance is keeping ElectricAid in safe hands. Thanks also to our officers Deaglan, Hilary and Anne your work is of paramount importance to the smooth and efficient running of ElectricAid. To our trustees and committee members, time is a finite resource, you cannot save it for a rainy day or make it from thin air. Your time and commitment is truly appreciated.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2018

The Executive Committee present their report along with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st December 2018. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 2 (page 38) to the accounts and comply with the charity's constitution, Section 207 of the Taxes Consolidated Act 1997, the Charities Act 1961 to 1973 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective in 1st January 2015).

Structure, Governance and Management

The Executive Committee and the trustees who held office during the financial year and at the date of this report are set out on the information page.

Trustees

Five Trustees shall control the funds of the Scheme and make the disbursements authorised by the Executive Committee.

Appointment as a Trustee shall be for a period of three years only and shall be renewable at the end of each such period. Officers or members of the Executive Committee shall not be eligible for appointment as Trustees. Two of the Trustees shall be elected at each third Annual General Meeting of the Scheme. The Chief Executive of the ESB shall nominate two Trustees as soon as practicable after the members have elected their two Trustees. The Chief Executive of EirGrid may nominate one Trustee as soon as practicable after the members have elected their Trustees.

An elected Trustee may retire by written resignation or shall automatically retire if required to do so by a decision of the members attending an Annual General Meeting or an Extraordinary General Meeting. The Chief Executive of the ESB may revoke the appointment of a nominated Trustee at any time. The remaining Trustees shall fill any casual vacancy arising among the elected Trustees by co-optation of a member of the Scheme. A co-opted Trustee shall hold office for the remainder of the term of office of the Trustee being replaced. A casual vacancy among the nominated Trustees shall be filled by a person nominated by the Chief Executive of the ESB to hold office for the remainder of the term of office of the person being replaced.

The Trustee shall not be liable to make good any deficiency in the funds of the Scheme but shall be liable only for such sums of money as shall be actually received by them on account of the Scheme.

Executive Committee

Administration of the Scheme shall be carried out by the Executive Committee, which shall comprise: Honorary Officers, Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer, elected by the members and at least six and not more than ten members elected by the membership at the AGM.

The Executive Committee shall meet as necessary for the administration of the Scheme but in any event the Executive Committee shall meet not less than four times per annum. A notice of the meeting and agenda shall be sent to every member of the committee. A quorum for every meeting shall be half of the committee members. In the absence of the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson one of the other committee members shall, by agreement, chair the meeting. For the purpose of voting at meetings all members shall have a vote and in the case of a tie the person chairing the meeting shall have a casting vote. Decisions taken at meetings will be on simple majority basis. Any vacancies that arise in the committee will be filled by co-opting by the committee. Such co-options may have regard to the executive election at the previous AGM. Requests for aid (with the exception of requests for emergency relief aid) must be submitted to the Honorary Secretary at least a week in advance of any meeting. Requests may be made by any recognized charitable organization or agency, or by a member of the Scheme on behalf of such organization or agency. For the purpose of advancing the objects of Electricaid, sub committees may be set up by the Executive Committee. The powers and rules of procedure of such sub committees will be at the discretion of the Executive Committee at all times.

Risk Management

The charity Executive Committee have considered the major risks to which the charity is exposed and have reviewed those risks and established systems and procedures to manage those risks.

Objectives and Activities

The main object for which the charity is established is to raise money for the relief of want and to assist the needy at home and abroad, provided always that the income of the charity shall be applied solely for charitable purposes within the meaning of Section 207 of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997.

Grant Making Policy

The Executive Committee shall authorise the disbursement of monies to such projects or agencies as are, in the opinion of the committee, consistent with the main object of the Scheme. Notwithstanding any other provision herein, emergency relief aid consistent with the main object of the Scheme may be disbursed without the necessity to hold a meeting of the Executive Committee provided that the prior agreement of half of the committee members (including the Treasurer and the Chairperson or in his or her absence the Vice Chairperson) is obtained thereto. A copy of each disbursement authorisation shall be provided to each of the Trustees.

Financial Review

The charity is reliant on the following sources of income, the ESB staff / pension payroll donations, EirGrid staff donations, the ESB board and the taxation rebate received from the Revenue Commissioners. Total income for 2018 was €1,181,225 compared to income of €1,183,081 in 2017. There was a surplus of income in the current year €120,402 (2017: €11,273). As at 31st December 2018 the charity had reserves to carry forward in to sum of €478,030 (2017: €357,628), of which €24,293 is restricted to the Ghana Sanitation project.

Investment Policy and Performance

The charity does not hold sufficient monetary reserves to generate additional income through investments. All monies are held in a current account controlled by the trustee's with the principal banker.

Reserves Policy

ElectricAid hold a general income & expenditure reserve balance of €453,737 at 31st December 2018. This is to ensure, as far as is reasonably possible, that the charity's future expenditure objectives can be met, given certain assumptions made about future income streams. The 2018 Business Plan also identified a requirement that ElectricAid should maintain a capability of €50,000 for immediate emergency response in the event of a major humanitarian disaster. These funds would, if expended, be recouped from the proceeds of a Special Appeal.

Future Plans


While enormous progress has been made in achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (previously the Millennium Development Goals), the needs of the poorest and most disadvantaged around the world have never been greater. The ElectricAid Committee will continue to address poverty and development needs in the Developing World, social need in Ireland, and contribute to the relief of poverty and emergencies at home and abroad.

In the Developing World, we aim for long-term and environmentally sustainable improvement in the well-being of communities and we will continue to focus on micro-development projects in the areas of education, basic infrastructure and sanitation, health needs, food security, energy and micro enterprise. We will continue to promote awareness within the Electricity Supply Board and EirGrid of development issues. In partnership and support from our members, ESB and EirGrid, we plan to continue and strengthen our commitment to the struggle against global poverty and for sustainable development, world-wide.



INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF ELECTRICAID

Opinion on financial statements

We have audited the financial statements of ElectricAid for the year ended 31st December 2018 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and the related notes. The relevant financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the FRS 102. The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland issued by the Financial Reporting Council.

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the charity as at 31st December 2018 and of its surplus for the year then ended; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards of Auditing (Ireland) (ISAs (Ireland)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section for the audit in the financial statements section in our report. 1. General Information

ElectricAid is the Association domiciled in Ireland. The registered office and its place of business is Two Gateway, East Wall Road, Dublin 3, Ireland, D03 A995.

Statement of Compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102 “The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland” (“FRS 102”).

Currency

The financial statements are prepared in Euros, which is the functional currency of the Charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest €.

2. Statement of accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the charity's financial statements.

2.1. Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's constitution, Section 207 of the Taxes Consolidated Act 1997, the Charities Act 1961 to 1973 and the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Practice applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1st January 2015).

The audited financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards.

2.2. Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are general funds that are available for use at the executive committees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside at the discretion of the executive committees for specific purposes. The designated fund for fixed assets is that part of unrestricted funds that represents fixed assets held.

Restricted funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

2.3. Donations and legacies

Voluntary income, including donations, gifts and legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature, are recognised once the charity has entitlement to the resources, it is certain that the resources will be received and the monetary value of incoming resources can be measured with sufficient reliability.

2.4. Expenditure on charitable activities

Expenditure is recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

3. Income

The total income of the charity for the year represents donations received from employees/pensioners from ESB/Eirgrid. ESB/Eirgrid also commit to a capped matching fund on an annual basis depending on the donations of their employees/pensioners. All income arises within the state.

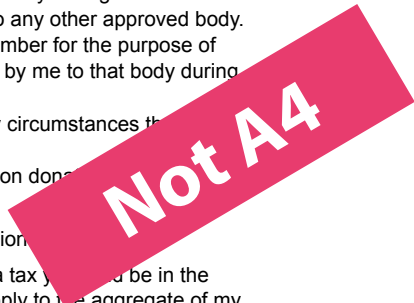

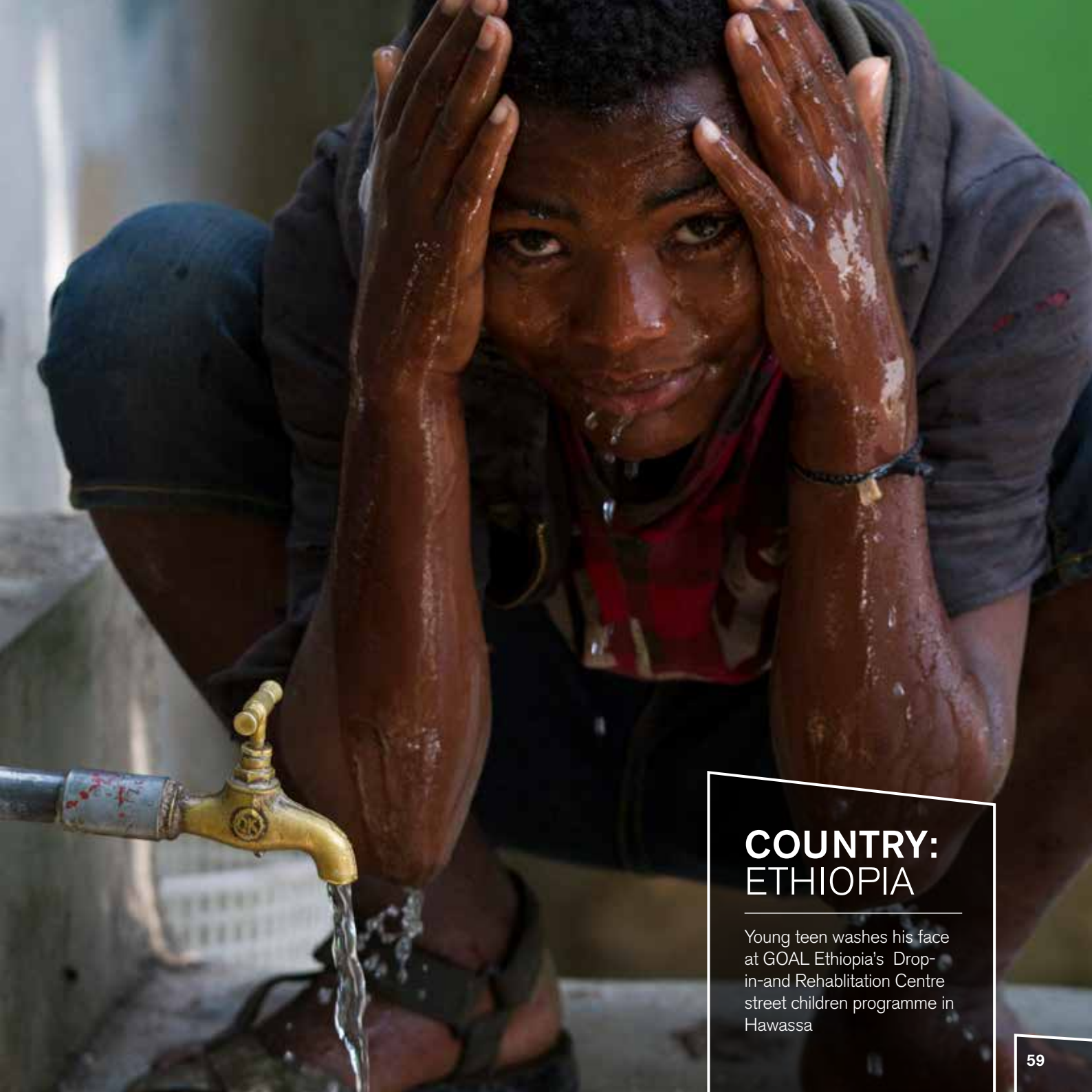
